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From the Rabbi's Desk

Dear Friends,

In this month of Kislev, as we approach the festival of Hanukkah, amid a war for the future of Israel, we are easily struck by the echoes of history resounding through the ages. Hanukkah celebrates the spiritual victory of light over darkness and a military victory over a regime that sought to destroy our future as Jews. These days, time seems to wash over itself in overlapping waves of meaning.

Our history and the wisdom of our Sages have much to teach us about reclaiming spiritual strength amid the ruins. We are a people that has survived, and not only survived but flourished, despite the worst and most evil of human inventions across time.

There is a teaching in our Talmud (Makkot 24b) in which Rabbi Akiva and his colleagues are walking amid the ruins of Jerusalem. "When they arrived at the Temple Mount, they saw a fox running out of the area where the Holy of Holies had been. They began to cry, while R. Akiva laughed. They asked R. Akiva why he laughed. He replied, that there are two prophecies in the Bible in which one depends upon the other. First, Uriah's prophecy foretells the destruction of Zion. But Zechariah's later prophecy speaks of its restoration." R. Akiva continued saying, "Now that I have seen Uriah's prophecy fulfilled in full detail, I know that Zechariah's prophecy will also be fulfilled." Hearing that, R. Akiva's colleagues said to him, "Akiva, you have comforted us."

In view of the destruction of the holiest place, the abode of God, Rabbi Akiva adjusts his vision to see beyond the moment. He sees the past, acknowledges the destruction, hears the echo of the Prophets and then he sees a new future of restoration, healing, and peace.

In the tradition of Jewish mysticism, each month of the year conveys a particular essence, a unique energy and quality that is accessible to us at that time of year. This month of Kislev (Hanukkah time) is associated with the quality of "vision." As we light our hanukkiot, we are invited to orient ourselves toward the growing light amid the darkness. We are invited to move out of despair and, like Rabbi Akiva, to deepen our capacity to see an alternate future.

Treasurer's Message

Dear TIP Community,

As we begin the second quarter of our new fiscal year, which began on July 1, I would like to offer an update to our congregation on the finances of Temple Israel Portsmouth.

The overall financial health of our temple is good. We are fortunate to own our historic synagogue at 200 State Street, the adjoining property at 170 State Street, and our cemetery on Banfield Road, all with no mortgages. Temple Israel has historically been self-financed through dues, school tuition, rental income, and the generous donations of our temple community. We have no existing loans.

Each year, we are fortunate to receive many donations from our congregation. In addition to our annual appeal, we have more than twenty other "restricted" funds, which are segregated and only utilized for their intended purpose. Restricted funds include ones for our library, kiddush, tzedakah, tikkun olam, security, music, prayerbook, and the rabbi's discretionary fund, among others.

The temple also has a long-established series of endowment funds. With endowment contributions, the funds are preserved for perpetuity, and only the income generated from investing the principal is used. A large portion of our endowment funds is invested in Israeli Bonds. This investment is more important than ever as it directly supports the State of Israel.

Through a collaborative process, we create an operating budget that supports our Hebrew School, Early Learning Center, staff, building expenses, and many of our programs, events, and Jewish ritual observances and services. Each budget is presented to the membership at our annual meeting. Through the first four months of this fiscal year, we are ahead on income and within 3% of our budgeted spending. The financial results are reviewed by your board each month so that any needed adjustments to our finances can be addressed.

Winter Lights

The dark days are here in many ways right now. The sun sets earlier and earlier, pushing us indoors, and at the same time we are faced with awful news from the Middle East and elsewhere. But Shabbat and the winter holidays roll on, encouraging us to turn away from the darkness for a little while and find moments of gratitude and even joy in community with others. In Judaism and many other religions, light is a symbol of faith, hope, and the divine presence. We begin Shabbat by lighting our candles against the darkness, and at Hanukkah we add more light each night as we remember our strength and perseverance in the face of struggles of long ago.

This year Hanukkah starts at sundown on the night of Thursday, December 7, and continues until sunset on Friday, December 15.



We plan to light candles at the temple on seven of the eight nights of Hanukkah. Please join us to usher in the light together.

In case of inclement weather, we will light candles in the Shmooze rather than in the courtyard.

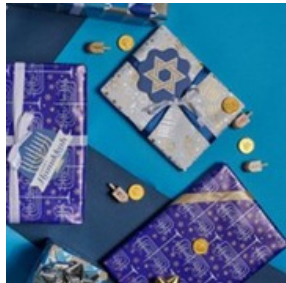

To get ready for playing dreidel next month, we began spinning tops—and spinning ourselves.

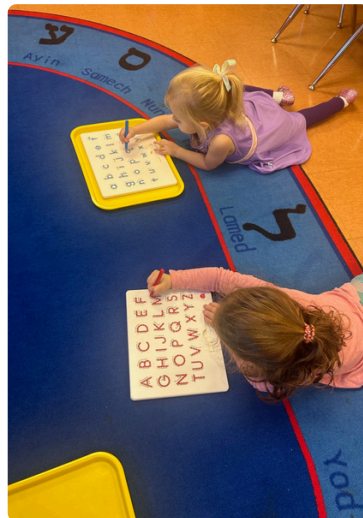

Holocaust Torah

On October 25, the Hebrew School and congregation held a siyyum ceremony to celebrate the successful repair and return of Holocaust Torah Scroll MST #486 (an orphan scroll). The event was very successful, poignant, and meaningful.

Since March 25, 2015, Temple Israel has housed one of the Memorial Scrolls Trust's Torah scrolls on permanent loan. This special Torah has been used for the celebration of all life-cycle events, events that affirm the continuity of the Jewish people. These events include the High Holidays, baby namings, b'nei mitzvah, and aufrufs (the calling of a bride and groom for an aliyah prior to their wedding). The Czech scrolls, including MST #486, are survivors and silent witnesses. They represent not only the lost communities of Bohemia and Moravia where they originated, but all the communities which perished in the Shoah. Recently, our scroll needed some restorative repairs, which were completed over the summer by Rabbi Kevin Hale, Sofer STaM, a traditionally trained Torah scribe.

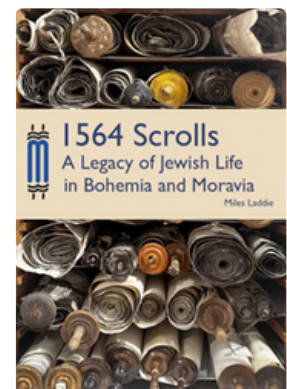
Over forty Hebrew School students and their teachers attended the two educational sessions held by Rabbi Hale, after which about forty-five congregants participated in the siyyum ceremony. Rabbi Hale tailored his presentations, engaging the students by demonstrating the materials and methods used



by scribes to write a Torah and providing other detail to the adults. He was clearly effective, evoking much inquisitiveness among the Hebrew School students, and spirit and interest among all the adults. Greetings were read from Jeffrey Ohrenstein, Trustee/Chairman of the Memorial Scrolls Trust in London. Everyone present contributed, either by coming up and reciting a *kavanah* (intention) to empower Rabbi Hale to fill in a letter on their behalf, or by participating in a group aliyah. Rabba Kaya was given the honor of filling in the final letter herself. After the ink on all the completed letters dried, the Torah was declared kosher by Rabba Kaya. After the group aliyah, the Torah was carried from the Social Hall to the Aron (Ark) in the sanctuary, with a procession of joyful followers. The event was a moving experience for all who came. Thanks are due to the organizing committee and all those involved in arranging and funding the repairs that provided the cause for the celebration.

What makes a healthy argument? Is it a debate in which each party tries to prove the other party wrong? Is it a negotiation when everyone gives up something in order to arrive at consensus? Or is it a chance to learn a new perspective and gain deeper understanding?

On November 5, forty people gathered in the Social Hall for a Zoom from Israel with Robbie Gingras, founder and author (with Abi Dauber Sterne) of *Stories for the Sake of Argument*. In breakout sessions, attendees shared their experiences related to the events of October 7 and their willingness to engage in difficult conversations. Finally, groups discussed the story, "I Was Born Here." Some questions and responses: Do people have different goals in the argument? Clarify first. Is there room for emotion? Yes, but emotion doesn't have a veto. There's no agreement on the facts? Go to the deeper issues.

Follow up discussions are scheduled for two Sunday mornings, 10:30-12, on 12/17 and 1/7. Thank you to Arlene Brewster and Rachel Kurshan for co-leading. It is not necessary to have attended the workshop to join. Books, helpful but not required, are sold online. Thank you to Rabba Kaya for locating this impressive program, to the Cultural Endowment Committee for sponsoring it, and to Rachel Kurshan for making it happen.

IAC will host a cookie decorating session following the Hanukkah candle lighting on Tuesday, Dec. 12. Shaliach Guy ben David will be our guest on Saturday evening, Jan. 27, for havdalah and an Israeli music presentation.

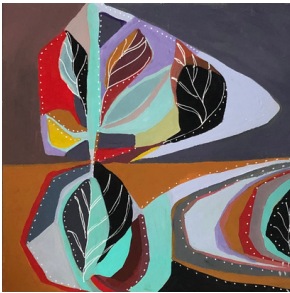

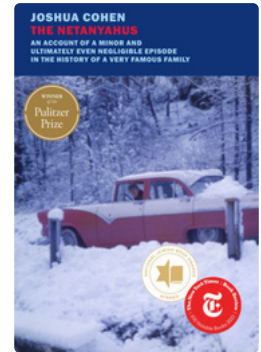
