Trees offer us many teachings. A forest contains a unique, invisible ecosystem that begins underground. The roots of trees in a forest do not descend vertically, deep into the earth. Rather, they weave in and around one another on the horizontal plane. As the tree grows taller, the roots move outward, as if linking arms with their fellow arboreal community members. This interweaving of root systems creates stability for the trees to withstand storms and powerful winds. So too, a community whose members are knitted together through love and caring, whose arms extend out to one another, can withstand the winds of change and even thrive amidst the storms.

Our Temple community is a microcosm of the larger communities within which we dwell. Whether the Seacoast community, the State of NH or our country, we are facing the likelihood of great changes that may feel threatening and destabilizing. Like a forest, when we reach out and wrap our metaphorical arms around one another, building and engaging in sacred community, we are all strengthened. There are many ways to connect and invigorate our community here at Temple Israel. I invite you to engage, to consider volunteering to help with a project or event, to join a committee, attend a service or simply reach out to me to discuss ways you can become involved. Together we will continue to build a loving, supportive and inclusive community.

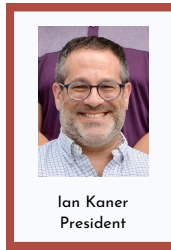

The Business of Community: Strengthening Our Synagogue Through Engagement

During a committee meeting I was attending, I recently heard somebody make the statement, “a synagogue is not a business.” Certainly a synagogue doesn’t “sell widgets” or exist for the purpose of sheer profit, but it is also more than a building where we gather for prayer. The generic purpose is a vibrant hub of Jewish life, culture, and connection. The “profit” of our synagogue depends not only on its leadership or programs but also on how each of us, as members, engages with each other as a community. Simply put, a thriving synagogue is built on the foundation of an engaged, participating membership.

So how can we each contribute to making our community stronger, more connected, and more meaningful? Here are some ways you can get involved (I’ve included names of people, you can use the directory to contact to take the next step):

Participate in Services

Regular attendance at Shabbat and holiday services is one of the most profound ways to connect with the synagogue. Whether you come to pray, reflect, or enjoy the music, your presence enriches the experience for everyone. Consider taking on a role during services, such as reading Torah, leading a prayer, being an usher, or even just come for an hour to help to fill a minyan. Talk to Rabba Kaya or Fran Berman to learn more.

Volunteer Your Time and Talents

Synagogues thrive on the passion and dedication of volunteers. Do you have a skill or talent to share? Whether it’s event planning, teaching, gardening, technology or marketing, your contributions can make a significant difference. Many of our committees and initiatives would welcome your energy and expertise. Talk to any of our board members or Ryan, in the office, to find out who you can connect your skills to our community.

Support Educational Opportunities

Lifelong learning is at the heart our Jewish tradition. Enroll in a class, join a study group, or attend a lecture. If you’re a parent, encourage your children to participate in our youth and family programs or to be a Madrich / Madricha. Engaging in educational opportunities strengthens our connection to our faith and each other. Talk to the Head of Religious School, Erik Martin, Head of ELC, Tammy Roberge, or Ryan in the office to get information on programming available to our members, or even to suggest a topic you’re interested in.

Show Up for Social Events

From community dinners to cultural performances, social events are an excellent way to bond with fellow members. These gatherings help build friendships, foster inclusivity, and remind us of the joy in coming together as a community. Give Generously

Host a Shabbat dinner with people with whom you get along or simply use our library or our Shmooze as a free co-working space. When we create a sense of belonging, we strengthen our entire community. 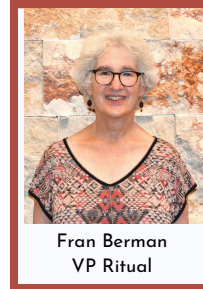
Commit to Tikkun Olam

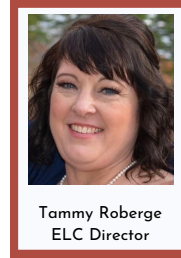
The Early Learning Center has expanded to a preschool with an extended day program.
